By-Law No. 1 Being the General By-Laws of Toronto Metropolitan University

ARTICLE 9

Mark Bonham – mutual fund manager and company founder; investment consultant; former president of Stoney Ridge Estate Winery; philanthropist and executive director of The Veritas Foundation; Doctor of Laws.

Janice Fukakusa - TMU chancellor; former chief administrative officer and chief financial officer of RBC; board member of many for-profit corporations and not-for-profit organizations; Doctor of Laws.

APPOINTMENT

Donette Chin-Loy Chang (Journalism '78, honorary doctor of laws '21) has been appointed TMU's chancellor for a three-year term starting October 10, 2024. We are delighted to welcome into this role someone who is already well known as a champion of TMU students. She has established bursaries at the DMZ, The Chang School, and the Lincoln Alexander School of Law (LASL), contributed to the Viola Desmond Awards program and the President's Awards to Champion Equity campaign, and created an emergency fund for students during the pandemic. Since graduating from TMU in 1978, she has worked as a reporter-producer and head of the Radio Canada International overseas service, a public relations strategist who has founded communications agencies both in Jamaica and in Canada, a visiting lecturer at the University of the West Indies, and a freelance journalist and journalism educator in Canada and the Caribbean. She has also served on the board of many non-profits. Donette will serve as TMU's sixth chancellor; her late husband, G. Raymond Chang, who worked closely together with her as a philanthropist, was TMU's third chancellor.

Shelagh McCartney, professor of urban and regional planning, has been named a member of the Royal Society of Canada's College of New Scholars, Artists, and Scientists. Her citation highlights the ways her "innovative partnership-based work addresses complex housing issues across Canada to build community wellness."

RECOGNITION

TMU has ranked among the top 15% of universities evaluated worldwide in the 2024 Times Higher Education Rankings for the second year in a row. The rankings use the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to assess universities' impact across four areas: outreach, research, stewardship, and teaching. Despite an increase of 450 participating universities (up to 2,154), we advanced from last year's top 20% while progressing to the Top 100 in areas related to three specific SDGs: Reduced Inequalities (78th), Clean Water and Sanitation (88th), and Climate Action (100th).

CONGRATULATIONS

Brandon Arkinson (Disability Studies '17) and Maayan Ziv (Radio and Television Arts '12 and Master of Digital Media '15) have each received Meritorious Service Decorations, which are Canadian honours awarded on King Charles III's behalf by Governor General Mary Simon. Maayan received the Meritorious Service Cross for founding the accessibility app AccessNow, which her citation calls "an essential tool in identifying and removing barriers." Brandon received the Meritorious Service Medal for founding the organization Moving Hope, which supports people in shelters in Greater Toronto; his citation mentions his support for "the most vulnerable members of his community" and his work in "restoring their dignity." Brandon also received the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers for his work over the course of 15 years in "advocating for affordable housing and leading anti-bullying seminars."

PARTNERSHIPS

SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AFFILIATIONS - The School of Medicine (SoM) has finalized affiliation agreements with Halton Healthcare and ErinoakKids; both organizations will provide clinical learning environments and access to research resources, as well as professional development opportunities for clinical faculty. Halton Healthcare operates three hospitals in the Halton region: Georgetown Hospital, Milton District Hospital, and Oakville Trafalgar Memorial Hospital. Together, they will provide additional clinical capacity in both suburban and rural contexts. ErinoakKids is Ontario's largest children's treatment centre, with

sites in Mississauga, Oakville, Orangeville, and Brampton (the main site). This affiliation will facilitate learner experiences in various specialties and support the school's commitment to interprofessional care.

EVENTS & INITIATIVES

SPRING CONVOCATION - From June 10 to 20, TMU hosted 13 ceremonies, at which 8,399 graduands received their diplomas. In total, there were 6,917 undergraduates, 596 graduate students, 735 continuing education graduates, and 136 juris doctor graduates from LASL. Nine new honorary doctors gave convocation addresses. All ceremonies were held at the Mattamy Athletic Centre (MAC).

ENABLING CHANGE – On May 21, the Government of Ontario announced an award of approximately \$150,000 to TMU through its EnAbling Change fund for the development of The Enabling Accessible Healthcare Delivery project. This project is a learning resource that will be developed by the School of Disability Studies to facilitate the interaction of students in healthcare-related fields with disabled people in the community so that the students may gain insight and help deliver more accessible and sensitive healthcare. The project will be developed as a pilot for health-care related schools in FCS, with the ultimate goal of introducing it to the SoM.

PRIDE MONTH - Throughout the month of June, TMU held events to celebrate Pride Month. For the first time, the Global Inclusive Pride Flag (which replaces the 1978 version of the Pride Flag) was flown on top of the MAC. The Positive Space Pride Kick-off and Mixer, sponsored by the Office of the Vice-President, Equity and Community Inclusion and hosted by the Positive Space Faculty and Staff Network at the Urban Farm, was TMU's largest Pride event to date, with over 170 attendees. An online Book Talk event hosted by Alumni Relations featured Governor General's Award-winning author and alum Anuja Varghese (Nonprofit and Voluntary Sector Management '19). The virtual event "Improving 2SLGBTQIA+ Health Using Community Based Research," organized in collaboration with Positive Space's new 2SLGBTQ+ SRC Network, highlighted the work of the Health Outcome Promotion and Engagement (HOPE) Centre for Sexual and Gender Minority People. Athletics & Recreation held two group fitness classes for the 2SLGBTQ+ community: a Pride dance party and a Pride Ride spin.

BLACK EXCELLENCE GRADUATION CELEBRATION – On June 13, TMU hosted its fifth annual Black Students' Graduation Celebration. Approximately 150 Black graduands and graduates gathered with friends and relatives to enjoy live music; remarks by keynote speaker Grace Camille-Munroe, interim director of TMU's Black Scholarship Institute; and prize giveaways. At a private pre-celebration, the graduands and graduates decorated a memory book, wrote letters to their future selves, and signed thank-you cards to loved ones. The event was organized by the Black Excellence Committee – a collaboration between the Presidential Implementation Committee to Confront Anti-Black Racism; the Office of the Vice-President, Equity and Community Inclusion; the Tri-Mentoring Program and Student Life Programs; and the Talent Management Centre of Expertise.

NSERC DISCOVERY GRANTS – On June 14, the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) announced more than \$4.5 million in funding over the next five years for 24 TMU researchers. Twenty-two of them have received five-year Discovery Grants, which the council states "will support researchers venturing into uncharted territory to find solutions to pressing issues." Five of these researchers have received an additional Discovery Launch Supplement, which provides early-career researcher support. In addition, two faculty members have received Research Tools and Instruments grants, which provide infrastructure support. TMU's successful applicants span the faculties of arts, engineering and architectural science, and science, as well as the TRSM.

NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY - On June 21, TMU celebrated National Indigenous Peoples Day with events in the Student Learning Centre (SLC) and the Kerr Hall Quad, and online. The day began with the lighting of a sacred fire in the quad and a sunrise ceremony led by Community Elder Jimmy Dick. In the SLC, Amy Desjarlais, lead facilitator of Rebirthed Teachings, performed a song; Joanne Okimawininew Dallaire, Elder (Ke Shay Hayo) and senior advisor, Indigenous relations and reconciliation, gave a welcome; head of Saagajiwe Michael Doxtator delivered a keynote teaching, and Elder Nokomis Mary Elliott gave a virtual knowledge sharing presentation. Other events included a lunch and spirit plate prayer and offering, a button-making session, a pow wow-themed workout, an Indigenous campus art tour, and a children's story time circle. The quad hosted an Indigenous vendors market. This year's event was organized by a collective of Indigenous and non-Indigenous colleagues led by Crystal Osawamick, manager of Indigenous events and special projects.

ADDRESSING DEMENTIA - On July 2, TMU announced a \$3-million donation from the Slaight Family Foundation to the National Institute on Ageing (NIA) to lead a national campaign raising awareness about dementia, including its prevention, treatment, and care. The campaign will involve digital content hosted by the NIA and developed in collaboration with people living with dementia, as well as a network of partners. The NIA will also develop practical, best-in-class resources for those affected by dementia as well as their families and caregivers, and amplify them through the campaign.

Toronto Metropolitan University Board of Governors Report from the Provost and Vice-President, Academic October 1, 2024



BOARD GREETINGS – To all new and returning members of the TMU Board of Governors, welcome to the 2024–25 academic year!

As we move into the fall semester, I am pleased to share with you a few highlights of encouraging developments over the summer. Together, they will help to sustain our community's enthusiasm while advancing our commitments to inclusion, innovation, and excellence:

ORIENTATION WEEK AND MOVE-IN – This year's Orientation Week took place from August 25 to September 2, with 5,872 students registered for 106 tailored events supported by 402 volunteers. The week emphasized holistic health with the theme "Be Well. Feel Well. Do Well." It kicked off with the annual move-in event, during which Housing and Residence Life welcomed more than 1000 students to TMU's three residence buildings. Other highlights included the Invocation event in the Kerr Hall Quad, during which students attempted to break the world record for most high fives given to a mascot (in this case, Frankie B. Bold) in one minute, coming up just short of the record; SLC Live, during which every floor of the Student Learning Centre with music, food, games, and other activities, all organized by faculties and departments; an International Night Market on Gould Street featuring student vendors, music, and a dance party; the Sustainability Amazing Race, during which teams of students raced across campus to complete sustainability-related challenges; the annual Body Positivity Fashion Show and multi-genre concert Fiesta del Fuego; and the concluding event, "Escape the Soak," a water fight in the Kerr Hall Quad.

RECRUITMENT

In August, the School of Medicine (SoM) received its 500th application for a clinical faculty appointment. Clinical faculty members are healthcare professionals who will contribute clinical and classroom teaching; scholarly, research, creative, and innovation (SRCI) activities; service; and leadership. The SoM is confident that it will have the full complement of physicians needed to welcome Doctor of Medicine (MD) students in September 2025.

In 2024–25, TMU Bold varsity teams will together welcome a total of 51 new student-athletes: 37 from high school and 14 transfers. These athletes include players with previous professional experience, players who were captains at other universities, members of national teams, and former NCAA Division 1 players.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS

The EL Hub has received approximately \$550,000 from Co-operative Education and Work-Integrated Learning (CEWIL) Canada for the new bursary program Pathways to Equity, which will financially support up to 530 under-resourced students in Fall 2024. It will offset costs associated with participating in unpaid work-integrated learning opportunities, such as travel, materials and supplies, memberships, childcare expenses, lost or missed income, and program fees.

The Ted Rogers School of Management (TRSM) has received a donation from CIBC to help students from under-represented groups access career-enhancing co-op opportunities. Up to 75 students each year will receive the CIBC Co-op Student Award for Equity and Excellence to cover the initial costs associated with accessing the co-op program.

This fall, the ServiceHub is introducing a chatbot that will offer students information and support in an accessible and efficient way, as well as a new live agent chat portal that will enable ServiceHub staff to communicate directly with applicants and students using their preferred methods of communication.

NEW COURSES AND PROGRAMS

The SoM has listed its inaugural 16 residency programs on the Canadian Resident Matching Service. In keeping with the school's vision to prepare primary care physicians to care for diverse communities, the SoM is offering residency programs in family medicine; six enhanced skills programs related to family medicine; and nine high-demand specialty and subspecialty programs, including emergency medicine, pediatrics, and psychiatry.

TMU has received funds through the Ontario Microcredential Challenge Fund to develop the microcertificate Clinical Teaching for Academic Clinicians, which is being developed by The Chang School in collaboration with the School of Medicine. The microcertificate will comprise five microcredentials aimed at upskilling practicing healthcare professionals and training clinicians to teach students who will help fill gaps in the healthcare system.

The Faculty of Community Services is launching an intensive leadership education program in Child Sex Trafficking and Online Child Sexual Exploitation (CST and OCSE); set to start in January 2025, the program will be relevant to those in healthcare, education, social services, law enforcement, and the legal profession. It will bring together the experience and expertise of survivors, leading researchers, and community partners to prepare participants to build strategies to address CST and OCSE across organizations, sectors, and borders.

APPOINTMENTS

Sharanjeet Kaur has been appointed chief administrative officer (CAO) of the SoM effective August 1, 2024. Sharanjeet joined the SoM in May 2022 as executive director; in that role, she led and recruited staff while advancing critical initiatives such as building construction, community engagement, program accreditation, and strategic and financial planning. As CAO, Sharanjeet will continue to direct daily administrative operations and oversee resource allocation while leading strategic initiatives and special projects, including the launch of integrated health centres.

Before joining TMU, she held a variety of strategic planning and policy roles in healthcare and education, most recently as director of executive projects and operations at William Osler Health System. Sharanjeet holds a master of public administration from the School of Policy Studies at Queen's University and a bachelor of science in applied health studies from the University of Waterloo.

Kimberley McCausland has been appointed as vice-provost, university planning, effective September 1, 2024. As interim vice-provost, university planning since September 1, 2023, Kimberley's oversight and direction of the University Planning Office (UPO) have added greatly to the university's performance and progress. Along with liaising with the Ministry of Colleges and Universities, Kimberley leads enrolment analysis and academic resource and budget planning, providing information for strategic and operational decision support.

She has also served as a key contributor to the development of the university's 2020-2025 and 2025-2030 academic plans. With nearly 25 years of experience in post-secondary institutional planning, Kimberley brings extensive knowledge and expertise to the role. Prior to serving as interim vice-provost, university planning, she acted as interim executive director of the UPO. In that role she led and supported work on the university's annual budget development and implementation. She also worked on enrolment analysis, performance measurement, data analysis, costing initiatives, student surveys and a range of reporting activities.

CONGRATULATIONS

TMU interior design students Nadar Al-Fahad, Dilara Cengiz, and Jacqueline Lai captured second place out of 27 teams in the inaugural Daniels on Parliament (DOP) Student Design Competition, hosted by developers Daniels. Teams submitted designs to transform a condominium in Regent's Park into a "hyper-functional contemporary living space" and presented their ideas to a panel of experts. The TMU team also captured the People's Choice award, voted by DOP homeowners, and took home a total of \$4,000.

Artem Duda, who played defence for the TMU Bold Men's Hockey team in Winter 2024, has signed a three-year contract with the National Hockey League's expansion team in Utah.

Kalysta Makimoto, PhD student in biomedical physics, has received a 2024 Women's Health Care Scholars Award—one of ten given to Ontario graduate students by the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care—for her work in helping identify Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease in women. Her citation praises her "innovative research" in "addressing this critical health care challenge."

Jan Wozniak (Psychology 2024) is one of the five recipients of the Ontario Ministry of Colleges and Universities' Autism Scholars Awards—and the first ever from TMU, which served as his sponsoring university. The award comes with \$18,000 and will assist with his graduate studies in social work at the University of Toronto.

Janet Koprivnikar, professor of chemistry and biology, has received the 2024 Henry Baldwin Ward Medal from the American Society of Parasitologists for her work, which focuses on infection and disease management in aquatic organisms. The award is for a mid-career parasitologist who has attained a position of leadership; Janet is the fifth female researcher to receive it out of 66 recipients.

EVENTS AND INITIATIVES

ROBOTS IN ARCHITECTURE – From May 21 to 25, the Design + Technology Lab, in partnership with the John H. Daniels Faculty of Architecture and Design at the University of Toronto, co-hosted the biannual, international Robots in Architecture conference. The conference's theme was "Beyond Optimization," which organizers called a "prompt" for participants to explore possibilities to "move beyond sterile parametric models and embrace the messy, stochastic reality of the incomputable." TMU hosted four out of the conference's eight workshops at The Creative School's Design + Technology Lab, including the two runners-up for Best Workshop, "Dropship Joyride" (about robotic motion control for filmmaking) and "Choreographing Cable Robots" (about ways to work with cable-driven robots in architectural robotics).

FASHIONING RESURGENCE – From May 30 to June 1, TMU hosted the Fashioning Resurgence Symposium, as part of the Indigenous Fashion Arts Festival 2024. The symposium featured six workshops related to Indigenous fashion on the topics of artificial intelligence, grant writing for fashion arts, sustainability, fashion in galleries and museums, mindful merchandising, and fashion's role as a catalyst to reopen traditional trade routes among Indigenous communities. Panelists included fashion designers, artists, arts administrators, academics, and museum curators from across North America.


CANADIAN VOTE SUMMIT - On June 5 and 6, the Democratic Engagement Exchange at the Faculty of Arts, in partnership with Elections Canada, hosted the Canadian Vote Summit. Over 200 leaders from all levels of government as well as fields including policy, civil society organizations, the media, and election administration, gathered to discuss democratic and election issues such as election modernization and integrity, voter turnout and representation, and misinformation. The keynote speakers were Naheed Nenshi, former mayor of Calgary, and David Frum, staff writer for The Atlantic and former speechwriter for United States President George W. Bush. One summit workshop, "Building Democratic Resilience to Foreign Disinformation in Canada," was organized with support from the Privy Council Office; participants were senior representatives from various fields, and their insight resulted in the report "Responding to Foreign Interference and Disinformation in Canada's Elections," which offers recommendations for strengthening Canada's defence of its democratic institutions.

PERSONALIZING LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENTS – On August 19, the Indigenous Education Council published the resource "Acknowledging the Land" on the Indigenous TMU website, to offer guidance and encouragement for TMU community members to create personalized land acknowledgments that reflect their own individual commitments to reconciliation. The web resource provides a six-step guide for creating such an acknowledgment, an FAQ that details the history of land acknowledgments at TMU, and links to additional resources to further learning.

ENROLMENT

Preliminary information from the first two weeks of classes indicates that the total number of domestic students at the university is about 2% higher than this time last year, while the intake of new first-year domestic undergraduates is more than 5% higher. We are experiencing a decline in international enrolment this year. The total number of international students across the university is down by roughly 9% compared to last September. This decline is driven by decreased first-year intake, which is down by one third.

As students will make changes to registration and course loads over the coming weeks, information about final fall enrolment numbers will be available in November.


Launch of TMU's first institutional-level Sustainability Action Plan



SUMMARY:

The proposed First Professional Master of Interior Design has undergone thorough assessments of academic quality and financial viability. It is consistent with Toronto Metropolitan University's mission, builds on existing academic strengths, and responds to student demand and societal needs. The proposed program has been approved internally by the Senate and the Ontario Universities Council on Quality Assurance (the "Quality Council"). The Quality Council is responsible for the quality assurance approval of new undergraduate and graduate programs, as well as auditing each university's quality assurance processes on an eight-year cycle.

As in the past, programs that have been approved by the Board of Governors will not be launched until the Provost and Vice-President, Academic, determines that sufficient student demand materializes and that the necessary resources are available.

BACKGROUND:

The First Professional Master of Interior Design is a two (2) year program that would be the only such program in Ontario and the second one in Canada. Estimated intake is fifteen (15) domestic and three (3) international students per year.

New Program Summary for Board of Governors

Name of Program: First Professional Master of Interior Design

Degree: Master of Interior Design (MID)

Proposed starting date: September 2025

Proposed tuition fees (2024-25): Domestic (Ontario): \$9,220; Domestic (out-of-province): \$10,994; Int'l: \$28,650

Brief program description:

- This two-year program will feature accreditation by the Council for Interior Design Accreditation for degree holders who wish to transition to interior design from another area of study. This would be the only such program in Ontario and the second in Canada.
- The program consists of nine courses, including studios and seminars. Students will also complete a one-term Professional Study Practicum (internship) and a Creative Project or Major Research Project.
- Estimated intake is 15 domestic and three international students per year. Some students will be expected to take two pre-entry courses to obtain foundational knowledge as a condition of admission.

Evidence of societal need and student demand:

- According to the Canadian Occupational Projection System, occupations related to interior design are expected to experience labour shortages in the coming years, with a greater number of job openings than job seekers.
- Population growth, new home construction, real estate activity and home repair and maintenance contribute to
 this outlook. There is also a growing focus in the industry on sustainability in design practice, which is an area of
 emphasis in the program's curriculum.
- Only 8% of interior designers in the province have a graduate or similar degree, potentially giving future MID graduates a competitive advantage when seeking senior positions in the industry.
- Student demand is expected to be robust and is projected based on the volume and quality of applicants to TMU's undergraduate program in interior design that have a previous degree.

Fit with TMU mission, Strategic Mandate Agreement and resources:

- The program is consistent with the areas of focus and growth identified in TMU's Strategic Mandate Agreement, which include Design and Technology and the Creative Economy and Culture.
- This program builds on the one-year Post-Professional Master of Interior Design program launched in Fall 2023, which has exceeded its enrolment target for Fall 2024 due to high domestic and international student demand. The one-year program is targeted at students with an educational or practice background in interior design, whereas the proposed two-year program is targeted at students with undergraduate degrees in other fields. The university has had a similar experience with its MA Fashion program, which has been very successful in attracting students with degrees in arts who are looking to develop their skills and expertise in a professional area of study and applied research.
- Supervision of the major research projects will be done by the existing faculty members, and requirements for studio space can be met with minor alteration of existing facilities.



Earned Media Detail

Results highlights

- TMU secured 13,524 media hits from May 1 August 31, 2024 with a total potential reach of 10.2 billion.
- The top article by reach was an article in MSN News, on the soaring cruise industry, which quoted Frédéric Dimanche, director of the Ted Rogers School of Tourism and Hospitality Management, with a total potential reach of 155M.
- The Advertising Value Equivalency (AVE) on media coverage secured during the period is \$105 million.



Proactive pitching highlights:

- The Central Communications team secured an entire segment with CityNews on May 26 dedicated to TMU's Formula Racing team and their car unveil, highlighting the amazing student experience the team offers through building a racing car.
- In July, research from professor Ian Young on contaminated beach water was featured in the Winnipeg Free Press, CBC Vancouver, Breakfast Television and Global News.
- In August, Candice Dixon and TMU's Carnival Arts course was featured in the coveted A1 page of Toronto Star's print edition, reaching more than 2.5 million via print and online coverage.
- TMU was featured on Toronto's number one morning show, Metro Morning, twice in two weeks - with stories secured on TMU's Carnival Arts course and for MUNA swimwear, a startup from TMU's Fashion Zone.


